Purpose for Studying Government and Economics:

Guide students to reason Biblically from presuppositions and foundational principles in order to recognize the nature and consequences of ideas, as well as to understand government and economies from a Biblical Christian perspective.

Cultivate the habits of Christian scholarship that develop from the ability to reason with the revelation of Scripture, so that students will know how to discern between that which is pagan and that which is Christian.

Form a Biblical worldview in each student by

teaching how to think and reason from truth through Christian principles and leading ideas of ownment (internal to external, cause to effect, choices to consequences; doctrine to character to government).

Study the nature and character of America's form of government and system of individual enterprise as designed by our Founding Fathers.

Encourage and challenge students to be true reforming powers and leaders by mastering and implementing Christian principles in their own lives and in their nation.

 - Definitions:
 - a. economy: [Greekroot: house and lose or rule] A frugal and judicious use of money; economy includes also a prudent management of all the means by which property is saved or accumulated; a judicious application of time, of labor, and of the instruments of labor (Webster's 1828).
